0850: Meeting called to order by the Council Chairman VADM Frank Donovan '59

Carter Honesty '90, introduced his replacement as class president for the class of 1990, LtCol Dean Ebert, who is currently serving on active duty.

VADM Donovan acknowledged CAPT William Price, class of 1936, who passed away this year and asked that the council keep his family in their prayers.

VADM Donovan noted that RADM Mike Rindskopf, class of 1938 President and Governance committee chair could not make it today due to ongoing medical issues, he asked the council to keep RADM Rindskopf and his family in thoughts and prayers.

VADM Donovan announced newly elected class presidents:

Review and approval of Fall 2010 minutes.

- A motion to approve from the floor was seconded
- Minutes approved by majority of "ayes."

Administrative remarks – no issue papers for discussion.

0855: VADM Donovan introduced Mr. Byron Marchant '78, CEO of Naval Academy Alumni Association and Foundation

- Mr. Marchant acknowledged and thanked members of the council for their dedication, especially the volunteer leadership of the council:
 - Chairman, Frank Donovan, '59
 - Vice Chairman, Jerry Smith, 61
 - Secretary, Josh Welle, '02
- Mr. Marchant discussed the work the Alumni Association has been doing in the past 6 months.
 - The Alumni Association team has engaged with SECNAV, Inspector General, parents clubs, alumni association chapters around the countrywith 15 fewer people than last year.
 - On the road to 26 markets, from fall to spring, football, fundraising, membership.
- Announced that a new IT director, Ken Kurz '99 will be onboard next week with a goal to improve the Alumni Association website with updates over the next 2 years.
- Financially the Alumni Association and Foundation have achieved a net asset growth of almost \$15 million, in large part due to recovery from investments and paid down debt.
 - Mike Mundt '83 is onboard as Director of Investments
- Annual report issued for 2010.

- Alumni association 2020 Strategic planning committee chaired by VADM Bob Dunn '51
 - Committee will help develop the next 10 year plan/vision for Alumni Association priorities.
 - 5 goals put out at December meeting of Board of Trustees:
 - I: Build and sustain relationships with parents, families, friends and donors.
 - II: Build connections across AA and Foundation with stronger IT and communications.
 - III: Enhance and preserve fiscal health with financial integrity, strategic budgeting and cost-effective programs.
 - IV: Grow contributions for USNA short term plan and continue to grow the culture of philanthropy.
 - V: Invest strategically in human capital to sustain the Enterprise as a high performing organization.

- Acknowledged the Another Link in the Chain program and everything they have done for the class of 2011, about to graduate.

- Acknowledged Dave Church '67 and his work with the Service Academy Career Conferences (SACC), number of people attending is increasing
 - 5 upcoming conferences in the next year across the country.

- Memorial oversight committee (convened in April 2010 under USNAINST 5060.8C)
 - Kerr Smith initiative: updated SOP on how to memorialize deceased alumni
 - Committee working with Class of '95 Run to Honor.

- Communications – new IT director Ken Kurz '99
 - working on getting on the IPAD application
 - web review and upgrade 2011-2012
 - survey of alumni will be coming out soon.
 - Shipmate continues to be important...and technologically advancing... Using QR codes in Shipmate. Print, online, multimedia.
 - Wavetops – showing steady open rate, increased traffic to website as a result
 - Facebook – fourth most popular referring site to usna.com (over Google)

- Membership efforts – goal is to improve membership from classes, parents, corporate memberships...statistics reflect moving in the right direction.

- Foundation/Development – thanked class presidents for support in surpassing \$7.5M Annual Fund goal for 2010.
 - Emphasized that First Gift, in particular, is very important, class of 2011 just began solicitation
 - Foundation candidates – 60 for 2015, 50 for 2016.
 - Mr. Marchant announced that he is travelling to Valley Forge with the Superintendent so he can see first-hand how the Foundation programs work.

- Distinguished Graduates Award – great ceremony this year, this year's distinguished graduates will be acknowledged on the football field during 2011 season.
 - RADM Robert Shumaker '56
 - Dr. Bradford Parkinson '57
 - LtGen Matthew Cooper '58
 - Mr. Corbin McNeill, Jr. '62

- “From the Yard”
 - USNA Strategic Plan Committee is working with Supt for to identify required financial resources needed to improve the margin of excellence.
 - Admissions are up to 19,141, a new record for 2015.

- Opportunities ahead – improve financial stability, keep up to pace with technology,
 - Mr. Marchant mentioned that he would like to start doing lunches with leadership at Ogle Hall to continue and improve relationships.

QUESTIONS –

Victor Delano '41 asked about the further development of Founders Day –

- Mr. Marchant said that they are brainstorming ideas for a USNA Founders Day– they began doing Founders Day acknowledgments during Homecoming at USNA but are looking to take it on the road.

Victor Delano '41 asked about simplifying the website after login. He noted an issue with the alumni database, unable to find certain people he knew should be there.

- Mr. Marchant said that both Ken Kurz and Hank Sanford are onboard to help with the website, and agrees that it is not as user friendly as other websites....fraud, privacy and database protection were the priorities when it was designed, now they are trying to make it user friendly.
 - They are looking to get rid of drag down menus, pare it down to what is most salient to users. It will be simpler and more user friendly.

Jerome Smith '61 asked if there were any other updates from last year's Navy IG report

- Mr. Marchant said that the Alumni Association is working with USNA to follow SECNAV directed gift processes...how to give and receive.
- The IG identified no defective process with Alumni Association, but Mr. Marchant acknowledged that paperwork can always use improvement. They are continually assessing how the Foundation gives to Academy and how the Naval Academy solicits gifts. The Foundation can solicit FOR the Academy, but the Academy may not do it for themselves. The Superintendent and President are ensuring paperwork compliance but it will not affect money going into the academy.
- The Supt is constrained with the entertainment fund....he must show that money is contributing to margin of excellence.
- No update on DOD IG report which was initiated after Navy IG.

VADM Donovan thanked Mr. Marchant for his remarks and asked a question about NAPS transformation – one of the 12 priorities for strategic initiatives

- Mr. Marchant mentioned the margin of excellence issue for fundraising – bringing NAPS forward over the next 10 years will require private fundraising, also need to bring candidates down to USNA more often, need to develop academic counseling programs up at NAPS also.
- In response to a question about prior enlisted candidates at NAPS – 10-15% of NAPS (300 students) are prior enlisted. The Navy has developed more officer programs that compete with USNA so NAPS is seeing less prior enlisted personnel.

RADM Doc Abbott '39 asked about Professors (Prof Fleming) accusing USNA about recruiting football players to the detriment of scholastic aptitude.

- Mr. Marchant stated that he supports admissions casting a wide net for qualified applicants and that the Dean of Admissions and Supt are always making an effort to improve processes and focusing on the quality of applicants coming out of NAPS.

1010: VADM Donovan introduced CAPT Robert E. Clark II, Class of 1984, Commandant of Midshipmen

- The Commandant thanked the Council, acknowledged that he does have a son at NAPS and one in the class of 2013 and he understands the importance of legacy.
- The Commandant discussed his leadership philosophy:
 - Walking the ship, staying with the Brigade
 - Maintaining approachability not confused with friendship
 - Mentoring, but also continually learning
- He acknowledged recent articles in the press about athletes, NAPS, diversity – it has nothing to do with that.
 - People with a lot of experience saw the potential for excellence in every person who comes into this institution....sometimes all it takes is one person giving them a chance.
 - Diversity has everything to do with perspective....where you come from, what you know.... not gender or skin color. He said he even saw it with the parents from I-Day to Parents' weekend.
- He discussed his philosophy of “Keeping the Main Thing the Main Thing”...4 pillars for an environment of excellence – Education, Empowerment, Inspiration and Accountability.
- During his time as Commandant so far he has realized that the root of all evil in poor conduct is alcohol. He has issued a few red lines in terms of offenses and has seen a 30-35% reduction in alcohol offenses.
- With regard to Honor offenses, he believes that education and training have led to a reduction in post-commit (2 for 7) offenses and a reduction in repeat offenses.
- The Commandant shared with the Council that he requires observers at conduct hearings in order to educate the Brigade on the process. For accountability, he wants to see the roommates, Team captains, ECA presidents for the individual facing conduct action.

- CAPT Clark shared that 54 foreign exchange cadets and midshipmen are travelling all over the globe, witnessing history.
- The Brigade is making an impact in the community with community service
- Athletic teams are doing great things, speaks volumes about mids, coaches and about the Naval Academy family.
- CAPT Clark discussed his fundamentals for success: Fighting spirit, integrity, respect, safety, teamwork.....not just for the midshipmen. For the staff, faculty, sponsor families, alumni.
- One Team, One Fight: his message for the sponsor families.
 - He goes through a sports analogy about the difference between a starting quarterback and stadium employees. He says the Naval Academy is the same way – yes, the midshipmen and the officer staff wear the cloth of the nation, but everyone here and in the surrounding community IS the Naval Academy....it is about all of our collective interests.

QUESTIONS -

CAPT Clark said he welcomes e-mails

Ingar Grev '89 asked about the “Spice” investigation. He said that he had heard that mids reported that they were getting unfairly treated and that they didn’t do anything. Mr. Grev asked how that investigation is going and if the Commandant could comment on midshipman reactions.

- The Commandant informed the Council that “Spice” itself is illegal as of recently by the DEA, previous to that it was illegal for DOD personnel on a SECNAV instruction from 2005.
- The way USNA found out that Spice was an issue was from other mids reporting issues
- He said that he told Earl Kelly that knowingly ingesting a substance to dull ones senses is NOT a mistake, it is a violation and those people are not compatible with military service.....even if they didn’t know the substance was illegal. Cough syrup is legal, but when taken to dull the senses it is NOT OKAY.
- He said that the Academy has ramped up training for the Brigade so that they understand the grey areas associated with drugs and alcohol.
- In the end, sailors and marines don’t get to pick their leaders....it is the job of the Academy leadership to ensure that they are getting the best product morally, mentally and physically.

Spencer Johnson '63 asked if the Commandant is happy with the quality of officers and staff on the yard because that is where the midshipmen truly learn ethics.

- The Commandant said that there are certain community gaps.
- He mentioned that he co-teaches an Ethics course with CAPT Rick Rubel in the Leadership, Ethics and Law Department. He also said that he cruises through classes and holds company officers accountable to know who the instructors and professors are that are spending time with their midshipmen.

Victor Delano '41 asked if other people are following his definition of diversity

- The Commandant said that everyone has their own agenda, some will follow, some won't. He can't control the media and can't improve them. He CAN control and influence midshipmen and he wants to reinforce standards, it doesn't matter what they can do on the athletic field, everything matters: moral, mental, physical.

Victor Delano also asked about wardroom sponsorship....asked if the Dant's staff will be getting involved. He said that sometimes it depends on the company officers.

- The Commandant said that now that the Academy is planning on staying at 30 companies, the issue of sponsorship has become less problematic, and the administration is ready to look at supporting a relationship.
- He said that it is not just company sponsorship, it is also monuments, benches etc around the yard and that it needs to be part of ATLIC, giving the yard some personal ownership and turnover.

Ed Keats '34 asked about midshipmen who submit qualified resignations or are kicked out and whether they pay back money.

- The Commandant responded that yes, they are held accountable monetarily or in rare circumstances enlisted service but that ultimate decision lies with the Assistant Secretary of the Navy.

Phil Rogers '48 asked about the submarine bonus

- The Commandant confirmed that the Navy does pay midshipmen bonuses for selecting nuclear training. Other communities give bonuses later in careers.

1115: VADM Donovan introduced CAPT Pete Nardi to talk about new USNA Cyber Security Programs

- Brand new initiative starting next year, 2012, national budget includes money to DARPA for cyber.

- Class of 2015 will start a new cyber curriculum to support Superintendent's initiative to graduate cyber experts.
- Adding 2 cyber courses to professional core competencies of the PRODEV courses for ALL MIDS
 - Cyber 1 – plebe year. Threat identification, spoofing.
 - Cyber 2 – 2/C year.
- Cyber has many issues that are not just technical, some ethical etc, classes will focus on all issues.
- Brigade-wide exercises in cyber warfare
- Intend eventually to graduate Cyber experts that will go straight into the ID field
- Working with NICE (National Initiative for Cyber Education), other service entities, Carnegie Mellon has a Navy fellow, and SAIC.
- The proposed USNA Syllabus has been shopped around, 10th fleet is sending the Director and Deputy director for the Cyber Center.
- Contrary to what has been in the press: i.e. "The Death of Naval History"— cyber is not removing the Naval history course, the course it is just moving. Navigation classes are moving to the right, Cyber II is replacing EE302, Naval Warfare is being rolled into JO Practicum.
- Cyber warfare will be discussed in all classes where relevant – ethics, history, etc.
 - Within CompSci/IT major there will be a Cyber track (not a separate major at this point).
- CCSS – center for cyber security studies – host lectures and seminars
- The program is looking for instructors (between existing and adjuncts – from 10th fleet and NSA)
- Long term facility needs – looking to build a new building (Project #P-621....waiting for the McNair road bridge to be fixed first, potential building between Rickover and Nimitz)

QUESTIONS –

Hank Mustin '55 asked how the new cyber program supports Navy requirements and who is in charge?

- CAPT Nardi said that USNA will not only graduate IDC members, but also educate line officers with a background in cyber warfare....we graduate people now with IDC options, from unrestricted line billets. ADM McCullough is heading up Navy requirements now.

Joe Moreno '93 asked about the history of defenders advantage and the assertion that it does not really exist in cyber, is that something that the cyber center is looking to explore or teach?

- CAPT Nardi agreed that within cyber warfare the offender has the advantage. Instructors are bringing topics forward in the classrooms now and will continue to do so.

Victor Delano '41 asked if the cyber warfare center experiencing issues with seasoned leaders that do not understand the subject because it is so new.

- CAPT Nardi said that the leadership of the Navy is working to educate senior leaders to educate the future, often we are all learning together.
- CAPT Nardi emphasized that all of the core curriculum cyber courses will be unclassified and therefore not restricted from foreign nationals who are attending USNA as exchange students. Summer internships, however, will likely required security clearances and with therefore be restricted.

Tom Wagner '97 made the point that 5 years ago that IPADs, QR codes, modern family etc did not exist, so he wonders if anything that cyber warfare thinks is important now will even exist in 5 years.

- CAPT Nardi acknowledged that they are going to need to continue to update the curriculum and work very closely with Navy entities like NPS to stay on top of the topics.

1145: VADM Donovan introduced Naval Academy Athletic Director Chet Gladchuk.

- Mr. Gladchuk opened by saying that 2010 Navy Football highlight tapes are now available to the public and offered one to each class president at the close of his remarks.
- Mr. Gladchuk said that he is excited about the kickoff of the 2012 football season in Ireland. NAAA is working with Anthony Travel to present travel and game packages for every price range.
 - Tickets will be available a la carte, not just with packages.

- The Irish Ambassador and Board of Tourism are “rolling out the green carpet” to support the event
- Non football events: 10 high school football teams travelling over to play Friday night.
- Navy Rugby combined with Notre Dame Rugby will play Trinity University.
- The Army-Navy game will be at FEDEX field in DC in 2011 – Mr. Gladchuk said that despite what people keep asking him, he does not know Dan Snyder....
 - The Washington Sports Alliance put the bid together to draw Army-Navy to Washington for the 10th anniversary of 9/11....they want this significant event in DC at FEDEX.
 - There still are club seats available.
 - NAAA is trying to keep ticketing prices etc. as advantageous for the alumni and fans

QUESTIONS –

Victor Delano '41 commented that parking at FEDEX field problematic last time the game was held there and asked what the plan was for this year

- Mr. Gladchuk said that he is not sure what the parking situation is yet, but he is confident that the situation will be dealt with and all the information will be contained in ticket packages. They intend to really zero in on communicating available options to all ticket holders.

Carter Honesty '90 asked Mr. Gladchuk to explain how priority levels will work.

- Mr. Gladchuk said that priority levels will be based on longevity and Blue and Gold membership. All information is laid out online based on donor levels for Blue and Gold.

George Zeberlein '54 asked about the plan for club seats for Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium.

- Mr. Gladchuk said there will be a big open area with a buffet, bar and seating like the Bo Coppedge room in Alumni Hall. This section will be on both sides with access to club seats, not in boxes, but open area. Not sure exactly how much they will be priced at this point. He wants to keep it affordable.

Ray Madonna '62 said that he knows that Redskins ticketholders are getting offers for Army-Navy, how is that going to work for Navy and Army fans?

- Mr. Gladchuk said that seats are based on personal seat licenses at FEDEX – 4 out of 10 sections are PSL, Navy's (and Army's) tickets are allocated from the rest

1205: **Break for lunch**

1307: VADM Donovan called meeting back to order

VADM Donovan called on Victor Delano '41, per the by-laws, as the senior decade representative for a nomination for council president.

CAPT Delano thanked VADM Donovan for his representation and service to the Council.

CAPT Delano nominates VADM Hank Mustin, class of 1955, to serve as Council Chairman.

The nomination is seconded by George Zeberlein '54.

VADM Mustin accepts the nomination.

VADM Donovan calls for a vote, the nomination passes by a majority of "ayes."

VADM Mustin acknowledged that VADM Donovan chaired the council during a difficult time for the country and the Naval Academy and has done so very well, he asked for a round of applause.

VADM Donovan offered that the Council is in good hands with VADM Mustin and thanked him for accepting the Chairmanship.

VADM Donovan inquired as to the status of LT Joshua Welle, '02 and whether he will stay on through 2011 in his seat on the Board of Trustees, which he filled to replace Capt Aaron Fielder, '01.

- LT Kate Kranz, class of '02 rep, acknowledged that LT Welle will remain on the Board of Trustees through 2011.

VADM Donovan stated that RADM Mike Rindskopf '38 was unavailable to discuss Governance Committee issues.

VADM Donovan discussed the necessity for the Council of Class Presidents to take over the issue of wardroom sponsorship from Dave Church.

- RADM Doc Abbott '39 volunteered to take on the project with the Commandant and Deputy.
- VADM Donovan and VADM Mustin will look to compile a committee with RADM Abbott to address the issue.

1337: VADM Donovan called for presentation of Decade Reports

30s and 40s – Victor Delano '41

- Discussed that Class Presidents could benefit from the same access to the Alumni Association as the local chapters.
- Offered feedback concerning the alumni database, they suggested that the database could provide a response when new data for the class is input or changed. Acknowledged that Mr. Marchant presented the improvement process during his remarks.

50s – VADM Frank Donovan '59

- Decade discussed company wardroom sponsorship – they would like to see responsibility move into the 'middle' classes (ie – the 70s and 80s) – younger classes are not in a financial position to do it and the older classes (60 and earlier) are starting to support the Another Link in the Chain (ALITC).

60s – RADM Jerome Smith '61

- Decade mostly discussed fundraising and money procedures for Class Presidents.

70s – Glen Woods '72

- Decade discussed wardroom sponsorship. They would like to see the Commandant step up and encourage Battalion and Company Officers to engage with the classes that are willing to or currently sponsoring wardrooms and companies. USNA leadership involvement is key.

80s – Ingar Grev '89

- Decade had nothing significant to report. They are, along with the rest of the council, eager to discuss and improve processes for tailgating, wardroom and company sponsorship.
 - Mr. Grev described how the class of '89 had a great experience with 4th company running a tailgater. The company was responsible for policing underage drinking etc.
 - VADM Mustin '55 acknowledged that there MUST be 30 classes willing to sponsor so no company gets left behind. He also wants to know how class investments will be protected....ie. nice TVs, couches etc. How do you protect money from not going down the drain?
 - Mr. Grev discussed some ideas – could a Brigade Striper help to oversee the process?
 - CAPT Perry Martini '71 said some classes have had good experiences but the wheels start to come off over the years when there is no policy coming from within Bancroft Hall. He thinks that

the Commandant needs to come onboard first with a strawman plan, acknowledging the Council's concerns before classes will come onboard to sponsor companies.

90s and 00s – Joe Moreno '93

- Decade also discussed the wardroom issues....acknowledged that there will likely be no resolution prior to the new council meeting (which will occur during football season).
 - Mr. Moreno discussed that company sponsorship can extend beyond wardrooms and tailgaters. The class of '93 presents a sword to the top 2 graduates from 29th company, a legacy they inherited from the class of 1943 through ATLIC.

1350: VADM Donovan introduced Bob Hofford '61 to discuss the Projects Committee

- Mr. Hofford explained that 3 types of USNA projects exist:
 - Publicly funded (ongoing)
 - Child development center
 - Ward Hall Data Center (with geothermal system),
 - Rip Miller Field (splitting into 2 practice fields instead of just one, bleachers and press box will stay where they are),
 - Rickets training room
 - Fitzgerald tennis courts (NAPS)
 - McNair Road bridge project
 - Perry Hall offices (NAPS)
 - King Hall Galley (renovation of new galley, new food service, new food court)
 - Halsey Fieldhouse – Quarterdeck construction (enclosed walkway from pass and tag to the visitor center), installation of a new turf field
 - Repair Lejune pool
 - Replace Brownson Rd.
 - Move Academic center
 - Naval Academy Club repairs
 - Leahy Hall renovation
 - Admin building renovation (Supt's offices)
 - Construction of Exchange and commissary
 - Parking Garage
 - Private-public partnerships
 - Columbarium expansion – class of '59 raised and contributed almost 1.6 million dollars.

- Class of '36 donated money to have 24 hour flagpoles, class of 37 donated for bodies not recovered memorial)
 - Class of 2011 is donating for the 9/11 memorial at the columbarium.
 - Hubbard Hall – moving crew team back in, will dedicate building once the rowing tank is installed (from private donor)
 - Rugby Fields
- Privately funded
 - Saint Andrews Chapel – donation from class of 1969 for complete restoration of pews, replaced organ, will be complete mid April 2011.
 - Bill the Goat, class of 1965 is fundraising to build one for the stadium....near '53 pavilion overlooking south endzone.
 - Gate “one half” – Commodore John Barry dedication, private donor.
 - Class of 1962 donation for a Ripley Memorial painting to hang next to Ripley diorama in Memorial Hall.
 - Aircraft Rehab project (Skyhawk association)
 - Class of 1973 fundraising to rehab the Macedonian Monument
- Projects that need sponsors:
 - Mexican and Jeanette monuments \$175K each
 - Piano for chapel – \$45K
 - Battle name façade rehab for stadium – \$90K
 - Supt's strategic plan projects that need donors
 - Phase IV of Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium renovation- \$20mil
 - Midshipman activities center in Dahlgren- \$4.8 mil
 - Naval Academy Prep School \$2.4 mil

1430: VADM Donovan called for new business

Dave Church '67 asked for VADM Donovan to pass along 3 items with regarding class reunions:

- All reunion requests should begin with the Alumni Association reunion coordinator, Eileen Proulx, nothing should go directly through the Superintendent or Commandant.
 - Several members echoed how effective and helpful Eileen is.
- Be flexible in planning, things will start to get pinned down 6 months-1year.

- Facility instruction has been revised and is waiting Supt review and signature.

- Kevin Callahan '73 – brought up the point that Alumni Hall is the only facility big enough in Annapolis to support a function of over 1000 people.
- CAPT Perry Martini '71 said the Westin could not support them for their reunion but that Dahlgren Hall became available and is able to support 1500 people.
